

Introducing ELIZABETH MARGOLIS


Elizabeth Margolis, Health & Nutrition External Engagement Manager for World Vision International, manages global health and nutrition policy advocacy and global events. She specializes in policy and programs for health and nutrition, food security, school meals, and gender equality. In the past, she has managed school meal programs and humanitarian responses in Angola and Burundi through World Vision. She led advocacy efforts for WV's Global Hunger Response and worked for the United Nations World Food Program. She holds a Master's Degree in Social Development, a Bachelor's Degree in Public Policy and Ethics, and speaks fluent French, Spanish, and Portuguese.

Her speech entitled, "The Role of the United Nations in Resilience, Justice and Stability" will discuss the development of the UN and its effectiveness today in leading and enforcing world stability. Ms. Margolis will begin with an overview of the UN's humanitarian sectors and ongoing efforts of UN80 Reform and Humanitarian Reset. She will also evaluate the role of the UN in delivering humanitarian aid, including the ongoing war in Gaza. Her speech will also explore shifting global power dynamics in the 21st century. Finally, she will empower MUN delegates to take action and help resolve these issues.

Ms. Marigolis' interpretation of the HSINMUN theme focuses on strengthening food, health, and socioeconomic systems, so that they can be more resilient external crises. Strengthening global systems to withstand times of crisis will ensure ongoing justice in the face of political instability. This month, the UNGA will examine how effective the UN is in ensuring justice, stability, and the implementation of over 4,000 mandates they have today.

URC2025: International Support in Reconstruction

In mid-July, 2025, state leaders, representatives from international organizations, and members of the private sector convened in Rome to participate in the Fourth Ukraine Recovery Conference (URC2025). For a number of years, Ukraine has been suffering the effects of conflict and urgently requires the rebuilding of its cities, roads, hospitals, and other essential infrastructure. The conference centered on economic recovery, the renewal of public and social services, and the role of global collaboration.







Among the more than two hundred participants from around the world were Volodymyr Zelensky, Giorgia Meloni (Prime Minister of Italy), and Ursula von der Leyen (President of the European Commission). The highlights of the conference included the immediate signing of the EU agreement, investment pledges from multiple countries for Ukraine's reconstruction, and the World Bank's housing compensation initiative. One of the most significant announcements was a ten-billion-euro commitment to rebuild public services, housing, energy, and infrastructure networks. The World Bank also introduced a compensation scheme to support families whose homes were destroyed in the conflict, helping them rebuild and regain a sense of normalcy. In addition to these, over two hundred private institutions pledged to provide technical and financial aid towards the reconstruction of conflict-damaged roads, schools, hospitals, and energy infrastructures through a combination of technical expertise and construction support.

Ukrainians are beginning to see the first results of these initiatives. To develop proposals for the rebuilding of towns and services, a large number of workshops and discussion panels were set up to harness international support for the building of a self-sustaining economy. Ukrainian participants stressed the importance of education, health, and community businesses, empowering them with the ability to drive local improvements through reconstruction.


Given the conflict with Russia and the scale of destruction, Ukraine is accelerating recovery in the hardest-hit areas. The level of international support for Ukraine is unprecedented, yet aid effectiveness, extensive logistical challenges, and infrastructure gaps are still persistent hurdles. Experts highlighted the urgency of combining immediate measures with long-term economic planning. They noted that reconstruction should reflect community needs, focusing on better living conditions, job creation, and more resilience. Ukraine's recovery now rests on coordinated efforts from international donors, local authorities, institutions, and non-profits, whose contributions are becoming the foundation of rebuilding.

URC2025 illustrates to the world Ukraine's recovery needs and showcases the post-conflict development potential of international collaboration. If the government, civil society, and the private sector work together, Ukraine can achieve economic recovery, political stability, and sustainable, multi-dimensional development in the coming years.


GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2:




GENERAL ASSEMBLY 4:


